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## A LETTER FROM OUR PRESIDENT & CEO



James L. Holt President & CEO

Last year, we emerged ready to finally bring the full slate of Memphis in May events and activities back in 2022. We rebuilt our staff and were determined to produce the festival our fans missed, and the city deserved.

After a nearly three-year absence, we knew the festival needed to come back big, and we did so, despite being temporarily relocated away from our decade's long riverfront home in Tom Lee Park in downtown Memphis. Sentiments during the events and surveys revealed our fans were pleased to enjoy the live music, the championship barbecue competition, and the run without restrictions. However, they deeply missed the riverfront setting in Tom Lee Park at our two major events - Beale Street Music Festival and the World Championship Barbecue Cooking Contest.

Holding our two largest events away from the familiar turf created challenges, including significant increases in operational expenses as well as many long-term fans' decisions to opt out because of the temporary move to the Fairgrounds in Liberty Park in Midtown Memphis. Attendance at both events declined significantly with fewer than 115,000 patrons in 2022. Making this the lowest attended year in over two decades. As a result, we sustained the largest economic loss in the organization's 46-year history – \$2.237 million in FY2022.

The temporary displacement from our riverfront setting was the key factor in the dramatic decline, along with other factors such as the ongoing COVID pandemic, inflationary environment, and top-tier artist cancelations at Beale Street Music Festival also contributing to the decline in attendance.

Despite the massive losses incurred during the COVID era, we stand ready to return to the home our fans know and love along the majestic riverfront in downtown Memphis in 2023. We look forward to seeing you at the 46th edition of the Memphis in May International Festival in Tom Lee Park.

# MEMPHIS IN MAY FESTIVAL OVERVIEW

2022 was a rebuilding year for Memphis in May as the organization followed a road to recovery following the full shutdown in 2020 and partial festival in 2021. The organization's leadership set to work rebuilding the festival infrastructure bringing back staffing to pre-pandemic levels and ramping up for full-scale events. As the producers of our city's largest and most popular events, *we knew it was important to come back big* – for *Memphis* to come back big.

The 45<sup>th</sup> edition of Memphis in May International Festival featured an action-packed calendar full of events in May 2022, including a powerhouse lineup for the Beale Street Music Festival, a full-scale World Championship Barbecue Cooking Contest, runner's favorite Great American River Run, and the impactful international salute to Ghana. Plus, a rare royal visit from His Majesty Otumfuo Osei Tutu II, King of the Ashanti – a first for Memphis and the state of Tennessee.

Our two largest events, BSMF and WCBCC were displaced from our downtown home in Tom Lee Park due to the landscape redesign and were held at a temporary location, the Fairgrounds in Liberty Park located in midtown. The temporary location created challenges such as the distance from the city's downtown entertainment district and the concentration of hotels along with higher production costs related to the event site.

Enhancements were added to the events at the Fairgrounds in Liberty Park to entice ticket buyers including a Ferris wheel, nightly fireworks, and partnering with MATA to offer shuttle services as well as a "Park and Ride" lot at the University of Memphis.

The events were well received by the attendees, but the resounding response from fans: they missed downtown and Tom Lee Park.

For the first time in over twenty years, combined attendance for the two largest events fell below 115,000. Because of the displacement, we experienced a significant decline in attendance and sustained a record financial loss for FY2022. By comparison, both events attracted 175,330 attendees in 2019 and 178,478 attendees in 2018.

We were back big in 2022, but we look forward to being all the way back in 2023 when we return to our downtown home along the river in Tom Lee Park.



## MEMPHIS IN MAY 2022 FINANCIAL SUMMARY



Financial results reveal a record-setting loss of \$2.23 million from the 2022 festival operations. Memphis in May's previous record financial loss occurred in 2020 when the festival was forced to completely cancel due to COVID and sustained a \$1.8 million loss. Memphis in May presented two reduced-scale events in 2021 due to the ongoing COVID pandemic. The organization received federal SVOG funding in 2022, which bolstered the financial position and provided the foundation to return to producing full scale events.

Revenue was consistent with results from 2017 and 2018 while falling short of the record-setting year in 2019. In 2022, the organization incurred elevated operational expenses due to the additional costs related to producing the Beale Street Music Festival and the World Championship Barbecue Cooking Contest at a different venue. Additionally, the location outside of the festival's traditional home in Tom Lee Park and downtown was not as attractive to fans, resulting in decreased attendance.

## **ECONOMIC IMPACT** A PROVEN ECONOMIC DRIVER SINCE 1977

Since the 1970's, Memphis in May has been a foundational part of the Memphis economy. The critical economic boost that comes from tens of thousands of visitors each May is highly anticipated and a cornerstone of the lodging and hospitality sector. The hospitality industry, hotel owners, and operators count on this business as it is built into their annual budgets and projections.

The sharp decline in attendance because of the temporary move from the riverfront to the Fairgrounds in Liberty Park drove down the festival's economic impact in 2022.

The economic impact of the 2022 Memphis in May International Festival on the Memphis/Shelby County economy is calculated to be \$72.9 million.

The total number of jobs supported by Memphis in May International Festival operations and major events is calculated to be 615 full-time equivalents. The Memphis in May organization directly employs 15 full-time equivalent workers.

The organization's spending with local vendors and the spending by visitors from outside a 50-mile radius during the festival supports 600 indirect jobs. These jobs are spread throughout the Shelby County economy in almost every business sector.

Memphis and Shelby County local tax revenues generated by the impact of the Memphis in May International Festival are projected to be \$2.5 million.

Visitor spending on lodging generated a projected \$1.2 million in hotel/motel tax.

The overall economic impact of Memphis in May International Festival decreased by \$76.2 million (51.1%) from 2019.

# BEALE STREET MUSIC FESTIVAL


It's been three years since the last time Beale Street Music Festival kicked off Memphis in May events, and it was amazing to be back with our signature diverse lineup. In fact, 78% of surveyed ticket holders say they were satisfied with the mix of artists from rock, hip hop, blues, alt-rock, indie, and pop.

What's not to love with the hottest acts hitting the Beale Street Music Festival stage? Crowd-favorite headliners like Megan Thee Stallion, Weezer, Van Morrison, The Smashing Pumpkins, Counting Crows, Sammy Hagar & The Circle, Sarah McLachlan, and many more brought the A-game back to Memphis.

The 2022 lineup included 32 first-time BSMF performers, including Megan Thee Stallion, Shaggy, Spoon, Dirty Honey, and Kurt Vile & the Violators. Plus, three 2022 Grammy nominees hit the stage; Megan Thee Stallion, Elvin Bishop, and Cory Henry. This year also saw a record number of local artists with 29% of the lineup representing Memphis talent.

Enhancements to the festival experience such as a Ferris wheel, nightly fireworks, and shuttle services from the downtown entertainment district were added because of the temporary location at the Fairgrounds in Liberty Park.

# WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP BARBECUE COOKING CONTEST

Memphis, Tennessee was again the nexus of barbecue as the absolute best competitive barbecue cooking teams converged for the World Championship Barbecue Cooking Contest on May 11–14, 2022.

This year, 212 competition cooking teams from four foreign countries and twenty-four states vied for the recordsetting \$147,100 in cash prizes along with the priceless bragging rights for winning the super bowl of swine. Teams who placed first in the trifecta of pig cooking perfection, aka the Whole Hog, Shoulder, and Ribs categories, were eligible to be crowned the Grand Champion.

Blues Hog from Washington, Missouri took the top spot with their championship entry in the Whole Hog category and were named the 2022 Grand Champion for the first time. As the Grand Champion, the team was awarded \$25,600 in cash prizes plus an additional \$7,000 for placing first in the Whole Hog category. This isn't the first time Blues Hog has cooked up a first-place trophy. In 2021, the team was first in the Shoulder category.

First place in Ribs went to Heath Riles BBQ. 2022 is the first year the team has placed in the number one spot. Sweet Swine O' Mine was first place in Shoulder, making this the team's 8th first place win, including two Grand Championship wins in 2013 and 2009.

The World Championship Barbecue Cooking Contest was featured on Food Network's new show, BBQ USA, hosted by celebrity Chef Michael Symon. Symon stopped in Memphis as part of his tour of the biggest competitions across the country. The episode is titled "Going Whole Hog" and aired on August 15, 2022.

## **GREAT AMERICAN RIVER RUN** HALF MARATHON, 10K & 5K

Runners laced up and ran along the Mississippi River for the 6th edition of the Great American River Run sponsored by AutoZone on Saturday, May 28, 2022. The run wrapped up the festival's first full lineup of events since 2019 due to cancellations and restrictions during the pandemic.

The half marathon, 10k, and 5k began with a fireworks-start on historic Beale Street. Runners enjoyed 11 oncourse entertainers, including blues legend Blind Mississippi Morris, the Grizz Girls, Memphis Drum Tribe, House in the Midsouth DJ, Just Larry the juggler, DJ MadFX, belly dancers from Pyramid Dance Company, and hula hoop performers from QDC Productions. Plus, the cash prize for the fast finishers was increased to more than \$8,500.

Payton Gleason of Memphis, TN was the winner of the 2022 Half Marathon - Male with a time of 1 hour, 8 minutes, and 22 seconds. This year's win was Gleason's fifth half marathon. Gleason just finished his senior year at the University of Memphis. Gisela Olalde Grandos of Nashville, TN was the winner of the 2022 Half Marathon – Female with a time of 1 hour, 21 minutes, and 42 seconds. Grandos also won the 'Queen of the Hill' competition for the fastest time climbing the hill of the A.W. Willis Street Bridge. 'King of the Hill' went to Ethan Valentine.

Runners from 32 states and 5 foreign countries as far away as Denmark and Australia lined up on Beale Street at the starting line and were led by a Porsche pace car along the Mississippi River and through downtown Memphis.

# INTERNATIONAL SALUTE TO THE REPUBLIC OF GHANA

The International Salute to the Republic of Ghana was three years in the making, and we were honored by the excitement expressed by Ghanaian natives living in the Mid-South. Originally slated as the honored country in 2020, the events were placed on hold March of that year due to the global pandemic. Program partners in Ghana, Memphis, the Embassy of Ghana in Washington DC, and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs graciously allowed for a pause until international travel returned in 2022.

During International Week, we hosted His Majesty Otumfuo Osei Tutu II, King of the Ashanti, who attended several cultural events, business meetings, and celebrated his 72nd birthday at the Black Star Black Tie Gala. Her Excellency Hajia Alima Mahama, Ambassador of the Republic of Ghana to the U.S., was also present throughout the week.

Ghanaian dignitaries and business leaders, along with economic leaders in Memphis, met throughout the week to discuss opportunities between the country and the city. The Chamber of Commerce president & CEO, Beverly Robertson, and the Ghana National Chamber of Commerce president & CEO, Mark Badu-Aboagye, signed a memorandum of understanding that established economic development collaborations.

Other meetings included the Architecture in Ghana: Yesterday, Today, & the Future hosted by the American Institute of Architecture Speaking Engagement featuring guest speaker, S.M. Quartey; the Doing Business in Ghana Seminar and International Council Luncheon hosted by the Greater Memphis Chamber of Commerce; and the IT Council Luncheon.

The National Dance Company of Ghana brought traditional music and dance to the Orpheum Theatre's stage during Ghana Live! Riches & Rhythms, and highlife music performer, Okyeame Kwame, gave the show a show-stopping end. Some events extended outside of International Week, and Memphians were able to explore the culture of Ghana, through several art exhibits and movies throughout the month.
